The Mind Trust's mission has always been to ensure every student has access to a high-quality education. For the majority of our 19 years, our work focused on serving Indianapolis students, families, and educators. In 2024, our team broadened our impact to more regions in Indiana and in a new state, Connecticut.

In any region we serve, our focus will always be on improving academic outcomes to ensure students can access an education that allows them to reach their full potential. We are also committed to working closely with local community partners to ensure any movement is grounded in local needs and perspectives.

In 2024, our team experienced a year of growth, innovation, and service:

- * With support from the Indiana Department of Education, replicated Indy Summer Learning Labs to four new regions. The program served nearly 9,000 Hoosier students who achieved double-digit learning gains in math and reading.
- * Launched our first initiative outside of Indianapolis, the North Star Fellowship, in partnership with Latinos for Educational Advocacy and Diversity (LEAD). North Star Fellows will develop and launch new charter schools in Connecticut.
- * Invested in the growth of two high-quality networks through our School Launch Fellowship: BELIEVE Circle City High School and Global Preparatory Academy.

- Supported the launch of two Indianapolis charter schools: Girls IN STEM Academy and The Match High School. Both schools replicated models of established, effective local charter networks.
- Invested in nine charter and innovation school leaders through the Emerging Leaders Fellowship, designed to grow the next generation of Indianapolis educator talent.
- * Hosted more than 600 guests for our bi-annual fundraising event, Celebrating Education Innovation. The event honored our founder, David Harris, alongside long-time board member and supporter Bill Shrewsberry.

We are grateful to the partners and schools who work alongside us to execute innovative, impactful initiatives. I'm proud of the progress we've made together and look forward to the collective impact we will have in Indianapolis, across Indiana and Connecticut, and beyond.



North Star Fellowship Launches in Connecticut

IN OCTOBER 2024, THE MIND TRUST, in partnership with Latinos for Educational Advocacy and Diversity (LEAD), launched the North Star Fellowship in Connecticut. The North Star Fellowship is the first national initiative of The Mind Trust.

The North Star Fellowship is modeled after The Mind Trust's successful fellowship programs that have supported the launch of more than 50 public charter and innovation network schools in Indianapolis. Based on our expertise and track record of success, The Mind Trust was invited to partner with LEAD to help support the strategic growth of Connecticut charter schools.

To meet the need for more high-quality public school options, North Star Fellows will spend one to two years developing and launching a new charter school in Connecticut. North Star Fellows receive a competitive salary and employee benefits. Additionally, fellows receive personalized

coaching, opportunities to travel to some of the nation's most innovative schools, and support through the school development process.

According to a report from the Connecticut Charter Schools Association, during the 2023–2024 school year, more than 5,000 Connecticut students were waiting to enroll in a charter school.

In the 2022–2023 school year, 95% of all charter schools out-performed district schools that serve the same student population in English Language Arts (ELA) and math on the SBAC, Connecticut's annual state standardized assessment.

Growing high-quality Connecticut charter schools with community collaboration

The Mind Trust and LEAD are working together to ensure the North Star Fellows are prepared to serve Connecticut students and families well and understand the needs of their local community. The October 22, 2024 launch event featured almost 100 Connecticut community members and leaders.

In January 2025, five charter schools received approval from the Connecticut State Board of Education, the first step in charter authorization in the state. This is the highest number of charter approvals ever given at one time by the state. The

Summer Learning Labs Program Expands to Statewide Reach

With support from the Indiana
Department of Education, The Mind Trust
replicated the successful Indy Summer
Learning Labs (ISLL) program to serve
students across the state through the
Expanding What Works grant program.


In summer 2024, SLL served almost 9,000 Hoosier students through programs led by anchor partners in five regions. The program will return to serve Indiana students in summer 2025.

In each region, anchor partners serve as the principal program coordinator, recruit site partners, ensure proper staffing, and are responsible for overall program management in their service area. All SLL sites follow three core principles:


 A focus on acceleration: The SLL English Language Arts (ELA) and math curriculum is focused on accelerated learning rather than remediation. Created by Lavinia Group, the curriculum is aligned to Indiana state standards, promotes critical thinking skills, and is grounded in the Science of Reading. Four years of program results prove that grade-level instruction can drive meaningful learning gains in ELA and math over a five week period.

- 2. Reaching highest-need students:
 Since the program began in 2021, it
 has aimed to serve students who
 may not have access to a high-quality
 summer program. This remains an
 essential commitment for anchor
 partners. The vast majority of sites
 are free to attend and all offer daily
 breakfast and lunch
- 3. Community and school partnerships:
 A hallmark of SLL is the involvement of community organizations as site partners, along with individual schools and districts. Community centers, churches, and youth-serving nonprofits have hosted sites. Families have shared that they appreciate programs hosted by community organizations that they know and trust.


Learning Gains Consistent After Statewide Expansion

We are proud to share that programwide academic learning gains remain consistent across all new service regions and in Indianapolis.


To measure learning gains, all SLL students take an assessment during

Indiana Learns: Increasing Access to High-Dosage Tutoring Support

INDIANA LEARNS IS A STATEWIDE tutoring grant program authorized by the Indiana General Assembly and launched in October 2022. It provides \$1,000 grants to eligible families for English/Language Arts (ELA) and mathematics tutoring. The Mind Trust operates the program on behalf of the Indiana Department of Education.

Program Growth and Reach


Since its inception, Indiana Learns has grown tremendously:

- * Extensive Network: Over 300 approved Learning Partners provide tutoring across the state.
- * Statewide Coverage: Partners cover 100+ cities, representing 91% of Indiana.
- ★ Dedicated Educators: 1,200+ teachers offering tutoring services.

Program Impact -**Engagement and Attendance**

Indiana Learns has demonstrated strong student engagement and attendance leading to meaningful academic support:

- * 8,080 students completed over 100,000 hours of ELA and math tutoring during the most recent program year (September 1, 2024, to March 15, 2025).
- * High Attendance: Over 80% attendance rate across in-person, online, and hybrid modalities.
- * Popularity of In-Person Tutoring: In-person sessions show the highest engagement rates.
- * Consistent Learning Gains: Students who engaged more frequently with tutoring demonstrated greater academic improvements.


The program's emphasis on equitable access and quality instruction has yielded significant academic results:

English Language Learners (ELL): Notable gains in both ELA and math, with online tutoring proving highly effective.

- Low-Income Students: Marked improvements in math scores, especially with in-person tutoring.
- **Hispanic Students:** Strong academic growth across both ELA and math.

Indiana Learns continues to make an impact on students across the state, closing learning gaps and creating opportunities for lasting academic success.

THE MIND TRUST BELIEVES THERE ARE three key conditions for a school to have the best chance of success:

- * A talented school leader who can execute a vision for student success.
- Contractual autonomy to make decisions as close to students as possible.
- Rigorous accountability to ensure effective academic, operational, and sustainability goals are met.

Growing schools that meet these conditions for as many students as possible is the heart of our school development work in Indianapolis and Connecticut.

In Indianapolis, charter and innovation network schools meet these criteria and make the most academic progress for Black, Latino, and low-income students. The Mind Trust works to grow great public schools and support existing ones to ensure every student can access a transformative education.

Our team has supported the launch of 51 public charter and innovation network

Supporting Educators and Existing Schools

THE MIND TRUST IS PROUD TO support a thriving community of public schools and educators in our city. We are passionate about ensuring the schools in our city are operating with excellence for the students and families thev serve.

Strategic Areas of Support

The Mind Trust's investments in existing schools continue to focus on four areas: high-dosage tutoring (HDT), governance, strategic planning, and literacy. These focus areas help schools drive strong academic programs and organizational sustainability. The Mind Trust's Great Schools Team offers several opportunities within each of these areas to schools that request support.

High-Dosage Tutoring Investments

HDT is 1:1 or small group tutoring at least three times per week and is a highly effective intervention to improve student learning. The Mind Trust has made investments to bring HDT vendors to Indianapolis schools, with a focus on

math support at the middle and high school levels.

Fostering a Collaborative Community

The Mind Trust's Great Schools Team hosts quarterly gatherings for Indianapolis charter and innovation network school leaders. The convenings bring in experts to explore key topics and allow for sharing best practices and collaboration between different school networks.

Indianapolis Charter School Enrollment Rises 6% in 2024–2025 School Year

once Again, Indianapolis Public charter schools increased enrollment by 1,381 students from the 2023–2024 school year to the 2024–2025 school year, a 6% increase. This figure includes independent charter and innovation network schools.

In the 2024–2025 school year, 61% of students who attend public schools within or close to IPS boundaries attend either a public charter or innovation network school. This percentage has increased significantly over the last few years: in the 2019–2020 school year, 51% of IPS boundary public school students attended a charter or innovation network school.

All public school types within IPS boundaries serve diverse student populations, with charter schools serving the highest number of Latino, Black, and low-income students.

* Latino students are a fast-growing group: 31% of Indianapolis charter school students are Latino. In the 2020–2021 school year, it was 22%.

- ** 88% of Indianapolis charter school students are students of color, with Black students as the majority of that group.
- ** 66% of all Black public school students within IPS boundaries attend a charter or innovation network school.

IPS enrollment remains steady, bolstered by innovation charter network

Total enrollment for IPS remained steady from 2023–2024 to 2024–2025 due to enrollment growth for innovation network charter schools in the district. Additionally, enrollment for public schools as a whole within IPS boundaries increased for the third year in a row, demonstrating that growing high-quality school options attracts families back to Center Township.

results for the ILEARN assessment, taken each spring by Indiana students in grades 3–8, can help our community understand how well schools are serving students and families. For individual students, ILEARN results should be used as a tool for families and educators to understand what concepts they've mastered and where they need additional support.

Since 2021, Indianapolis charter schools have made larger proficiency improvements across all student groups, surpassing averages for IPS, Marion County township districts, and the state as a whole. This holds true for math, ELA, and combined proficiency rates.

- * Black students in independent charter schools now outperform their peers at 10 of the 11 Marion County districts in both math and ELA.
- Black students in independent charter schools have made larger proficiency

- gains since 2021 than their peers at all 11 Marion County districts.
- * Latino students in independent charter schools now outperform their peers at nine of the 11 Marion County districts in both math and ELA.

Depending on the subject and student group, Indianapolis charter students have gained back the majority of the proficiency decrease that occurred between 2019 and 2021. Gaps along racial and socioeconomic lines have also narrowed during that time, bucking national trends.

- ★ Black students attending independent charter schools are 3x more likely to be proficient than Black students in district-run IPS schools.
- Latino students attending independent charter schools are 2x more likely to be proficient than Latino students in district-run IPS schools.
- * For Black students, 11 of the top 15 public schools within IPS boundaries



are charter and innovation network schools.

For Latino students, 10 of the top 15 public schools within IPS boundaries are charter and innovation network schools.

Special Distinction

For Black students, Indiana Math and Science Academy West surpassed the math proficiency rates of every Indiana district except one.

For Black students, Paramount Brookside and Paramount Cottage Home surpassed the math proficiency rates for every Indiana district except two.

2024 SAT: Indianapolis Charter High Schools Lead College-Readiness Rates Locally and Statewide

THE 2023-2024 SCHOOL YEAR WAS the third year that Indiana high school iuniors took the SAT as the required high school assessment. In that school year, the SAT was changed to an adaptive assessment, meaning the difficulty of the questions changes depending on how well a test-taker does on previous questions. As a result, SAT math scores dropped across the country. In Indiana, all student groups saw decreases in SAT math scores. These decreases make it difficult to compare performance over time on the math section of the SAT. On the more stable evidenced-based reading and writing (EBRW) portion of the test, Indiana students have still only increased their EBRW college-readiness rate by 1.3 points since 2022.

Students in innovation charter schools continue to surpass statewide college-readiness rates, both overall and for Black, Latino, and low-income students. Within IPS boundaries, innovation charter schools continue to lead in college-readiness rates.

- Overall, the top five public high schools within IPS boundaries are charter and innovation schools.
- * The top five public high schools within IPS boundaries for Black students are charter and innovation schools.
- * Four of the top five high schools within IPS boundaries for Latino students are charter and innovation schools.
- * Students attending innovation charter schools are five times more likely to be college-ready on both sections of the SAT than their peers in district-run IPS schools. These trends are similar for low-income, Latino, and Black students.

Innovation charter schools are also some of the highest performing high schools in Marion County and statewide.

- * Black students in innovation charter schools have college-readiness rates that surpass those of every township district.
- In Indianapolis, students in township districts have increased EBRW college-

The Mind Trust Invests in High-Dosage SAT Tutoring

To support students with SAT-level math, The Mind Trust has invested in high-dosage tutoring services at several Indianapolis innovation and charter high schools.

- readiness rates by 0.8% since 2022 while students in innovation charter schools saw an increase of 4.4%.
- * On the EBRW section of the SAT, Black students attending innovation charter schools have higher college-readiness rates than their peers at all 11 Marion County districts.
- * On the math section of the SAT, Latino students attending innovation charter schools have higher college-readiness rates than their peers at all but one Marion County district.
- ★ On the EBRW section of the SAT, five Indianapolis charter and innovation schools rank in the top 5% of all Indiana public schools for Black student college-readiness rates.



Study: Indianapolis Among National Leaders in Closing the Achievement Gap

AN OCTOBER 2024 STUDY FROM THE Progressive Policy Institute (PPI) shows that, over the last decade, the more a city has grown public charter school enrollment, the more that city has closed the gap in outcomes between all low-income students and all students statewide. For these districts with high levels of school choice, academic performance rises for both charter and district-run school students.

Searching for the Tipping Point: Scaling Up Public School Choice Spurs Citywide Gains found that in the 10 districts with the highest percentage of students enrolled in charter schools, low-income students citywide closed the gap with statewide test score averages by 25% to 40%. Additionally, when at least one-third of a city's students are enrolled in a public charter school, outcomes improve citywide over time.

The study also found several key points about the impact of charter school growth in Indianapolis:

- Indianapolis is one of the top three cities in the country to close achievement gaps in proficiency points between low-income students and all students statewide between the 2010–2011 and 2022–2023 school years.
- In Indianapolis, citywide student proficiency increased 11.7 points relative to all students statewide over an 11year period, closing 34% of the gap with all Indiana students.
- The gap closure for all low-income Indianapolis students, regardless of public school type, significantly



accelerated post-pandemic. This contrasts with many cities around the country.

The study shows that this growth has led to better academic outcomes for all low-income students, not just those who attend charter schools.

"I work with a ton of schools now, and they tell me about the good they hear coming out of certain schools in Indianapolis. They say, 'These kids are having better outcomes after graduation—what are they doing?' And they want to mimic that."

Education Next Initiative Creating New Generation of Educators

THE MIND TRUST PARTNERED WITH Marian University to launch Education Next Indy to inspire high school students to pursue careers in education by providing them with collegelevel education classes, professional development opportunities, and a supportive community of peers and mentors. The first cohort includes about 60 students from six Indianapolis high schools. Teach for America Indianapolis also supported programming during the 2024–2025 school year.

Each quarter, participating students attend a convening focused on specific topic to:

Participate in a professional development to prepare for life after high school, including applying to college and graduate school to pursue degrees in education.

Education Next Indy also works with two school networks with teacher cadet programs, Herron Classical Schools and Christel House Indianapolis, to support student access to college-level education courses.

School Community Partnership Investments Empower Local Changemakers

THE MIND TRUST'S SCHOOL-COMMUNITY Partnership Investments (SCPI) are awards that empower community organizations and schools to partner in creating programs that expand educational opportunities for Indianapolis students and families. Funding is often a key factor in the development and maintenance of strategic community partnerships. SCPI funds ensure schools and community organizations can keep working together on behalf of Indianapolis students.

In fiscal year 2024, The Mind Trust awarded \$350,000 in SCPIs to 29 Indianapolis nonprofit or community-based organizations.

Go Farther Literacy Fund celebrates five years of community support

The Go Farther Literacy Fund awards funds to families and small community organizations for projects that help build critical literacy skills for students in Indianapolis' Center Township. Awarded funds range from \$150 to \$5,000.

The Mind Trust is celebrating five years of The Go Farther Literacy Fund. In early 2025, 15 families and six community organizations were awarded a total of \$50,000.

The Go Farther Literacy Fund has awarded nearly \$230,000 since the initiative began in 2020. The majority of funds have been awarded to individual families.

For our kickoff year, TFA-Indianapolis and The Mind Trust co-hosted students during Circle City Classic weekend. The group also toured several local charter schools and heard from a panel of educators and HBCU alumni.



Celebrating Education Innovation 2024




